MISSION STATEMENT

St Mary's School seeks to provide an education firmly founded on Christ and the Catholic Faith.

Within a happy and caring environment and based on the recognition of the dignity and worth of each child, high standards are expected and pursued. Intellectual development is emphasised and fostered along with the pursuit of academic excellence.

St Mary's values the unique contribution of every child within the school community.

St Mary's aims to encourage an active partnership between home, school, parish and the wider community.

Equal Opportunities Policy

1. Promoting equal opportunities is fundamental to the aims and ethos of St Mary's School, Hampstead and is enshrined in our Mission Statement, which underpins all that we do. We welcome applications from candidates with a diverse a range of backgrounds. This enriches our community and is vital in preparing our pupils for today's world. We provide a caring and welcoming atmosphere where each individual pupil feels valued and can flourish.

2. St Mary's School, Hampstead is committed to equal treatment for all pupils, regardless of race, disability, religion or belief or sexual orientation (protected characteristics). We believe that the educational experience is enhanced if children are exposed to as wide a range of cultural experiences as possible whilst they are developing.

3. We seek to provide an opportunity for all children to receive the highest standard of Catholic education. We focus on educating the individual and in helping children to achieve their full potential – 'recognizing and valuing the unique contribution of every child within the school community'. We have the highest expectations of all our children.

AIMS

The aims of this policy and the School's ethos as a whole is to:

- Eliminate unlawful discrimination on grounds of any of the protected characteristics
- Promote equality of opportunity for all members of the School community
- Comply with the School's equality duties contained in the Equality Act 2010.

All members of the School community are expected to comply with this policy.

All parents are expected to support the aims of this policy and the School's ethos of tolerance and respect.

ADMISSION

The School treats every application for admission in a fair and equal way in accordance with this policy and the School's Admissions Policy. The School accepts applications from, and admits, all prospective pupils irrespective of their disability, race, religion or belief (or lack of religion or belief) or special educational needs and disabilities ('SEND').

Parents must inform the School when submitting the Registration Form of any special circumstances relating to their child which may affect their child's performance in the admissions process and/or ability to fully participate in the education provided by the School. The School will not offer a place to a child with disabilities if, after reasonable adjustments have been considered, the School cannot adequately cater for or meet their needs.

St Mary's is committed to supporting pupils who, for financial reasons, may not consider or have access to independent preparatory school education. In line with our ethos we offer a number of generous bursaries (up to 100%+ of fees) in order to enable as many as possible who meet the school's admission criteria to attend the school. Details of our bursary provisions can be found on our website or obtained from the Bursar.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

The School affords all pupils access to educational provision including all benefits, services and facilities, irrespective of any protected characteristic (subject to our reasonable adjustments duty and considerations of safety and welfare). The School will not discriminate against a pupil on the grounds of any protected characteristic by excluding them or subjecting them to any other detriment.

The School will:

- Treat all members of the School community with respect and dignity and seek to provide a positive working and learning environment free from discrimination
- Endeavour to meet the needs of all children and ensure that there is no unlawful discrimination on the grounds of any protected characteristics
- Ensure that pupils with English as an additional language and pupils with an Education Health Care Plan receive necessary educational and welfare support
- Monitor the admission and progress of pupils from different backgrounds
- Challenge inappropriate discriminatory behaviour by pupils and staff
- Offer all pupils access to all areas of the curriculum and a full range of extra-curricular activities
- Work with parents and external agencies where appropriate to combat and prevent discrimination in School
- Ensure that it reviews, monitors and evaluates the effectiveness of inclusive policies and practices
- Use the curriculum, assemblies and PSHCEE to:
 - Promote tolerance of and respect for each other, paying particular regard to the protected characteristics set out in the Equality Act 2010.
 - Promote positive images and role models to avoid prejudice and raise awareness of related issues.

The School recognises that discrimination may be direct, indirect, or arising from disability whether or not it was intentional. Harassment and bullying in all its forms is unacceptable and will be dealt with in accordance with the School's Behaviour Management and Anti-bullying policies.

RELIGIOUS BELIEF

Although the School's religious ethos is based on Catholic values and tradition, the School is inclusive and welcomes and respects the rights and freedoms of individuals from other religions and faiths (or with no religion or faith) subject to considerations of safety and welfare and the rights and freedoms of other members of the School community.

The governing body, through the senior leadership team, actively promotes the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

REASONABLE ADJUSTMENTS FOR PUPILS WITH DISABILITY

The School has an ongoing duty to make reasonable adjustments for pupils with a disability to ensure they do not suffer a substantial disadvantage in comparison with other pupils.

Where the School is required to consider its reasonable adjustments duty, it will consult with parents about what reasonable adjustments, if any, the School is able to make to avoid their child being put at a substantial disadvantage. The School will carefully consider any proposals for auxiliary aids and services in light of a pupil's disability and the resources available to the School. Further information on the School's reasonable adjustments duty can be found in the School's SEND Policy.

The School has an Accessibility Plan in place which can be found on the School website and a hard copy can be made available upon request. This sets out the School's plan to increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the School's curriculum; improve the physical environment of the School for the purpose of increasing the extent to which disabled pupils are able to take advantage of education and benefits, facilities or services provided or offered by the School; and improve the delivery to disabled pupils of information which is readily accessible to pupils who are not disabled.

MONITORING AND REVIEW

The Headmistress regularly monitors and reviews the effectiveness of this policy and reports to the governors on the policy's effectiveness in practice.

BREACH OF THIS POLICY

Pupils who are in breach of this policy may be sanctioned in accordance with the School's Behaviour Management Policy.
